Ways to Conserve Water!

The showers, toilets, washing machines, garden hoses, and other thirsty devices can spray your water bill with charges. Consider these interventions if you'd like to see your water bill evaporate.

High-Efficiency Washers - The tumbling motion of front-loading machines typically uses less water. Plus, washers that have the Energy Star label can use about 35 percent less water and about 20 percent less energy than machines without the rating.

Flow Restrictors - Faucets and shower heads that slow the flow of water can cut water use and costs. The best models deliver that lighter stream but fool you into thinking nothing's changed. That's the idea behind Delta's In2ition shower heads, which control the speed and movement of water and spray larger drops. This shower head also has a pause feature that cuts use to a trickle while you shave or lather your hair. Look for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's WaterSense label for fixtures that reduce water use by 30 percent or more.

Dual Flush Toilets - Toilets are a major source of indoor water use in most homes, at about 30 percent on average. An old toilet can use as much as 6 gallons per flush, compared to the current federal standard of 1.6 gallons. The newest models can perform even better, some using only 1.28 gallons or less, according to the Environmental Protection Agency.

Shower Timer - One of the easiest ways to cut water use is to make a conscious effort. A shower timer can help. One, priced at \$1.35 from Niagara Conservation, gets flipped over when the water goes on and tells you when five minutes passed. A suction cup holds the timer in place.

Water Conserving Plants - To save money outdoors, choose plants that thrive with moderate to small drinks of water. Experts recommend lantana, verbena, salvia, zinnia and rudbeckia, to name a few.

Rain Catchers - A half inch of rain falling on a 1,000 sq. ft. roof can amount to about 300 gallons of water. There are several stylish designs and accessories to choose from.

Annual Water Quality Report

Each year the town publishes a water quality report for its water customers. We mailed the report out on June 1st. If you did not receive one, you can pick one up at the Town Office. This report covers the period January 1, 2012 through December 31, 2012, and it provides a thorough analysis of our water's quality. We check the water twice monthly for bacteria, and we check the water quality every one to three years for other contaminates. Our water quality report is for your assurance and confidence that Windsor water is of the highest quality, and it is safe to drink. We are dedicated to providing our water customers safe drinking water.

Planning and Zoning Activities

The Town Council, Planning Commission, and the Planning and Zoning Department have reviewed and/or are reviewing several requests for conditional use permits and rezoning in June and the upcoming months.

May and June Activities

The Planning Commission and Town Council approved a 120 foot tall temporary monopole telecommunications tower near U.S. Route 258 beside the existing 1,009 foot radio tower for Verizon Wireless. This is to provide "4G" coverage for the immediate Windsor area.

Town Council passed a series of amendments to the Land Development Ordinances which the Planning Commission had recommended. They liberalized and clarified where vehicles could be parked in the residential areas of the Town. They also clarified and continued the prohibition on the outside storage of appliances, furniture and other materials.

Upcoming Requests

The Planning Commission will be reviewing and making recommendations on several important requests over the next few months. The Isle of Wight Industrial Development Authority has applied to rezone 79 acres of land on Buckhorn Road as part of the larger Phase III Shirley T. Holland Industrial Park. The Authority will be making their presentation at the June 26, 2013 Planning Commission meeting with a potential public hearing in July.

There also is a request for a permanent Verizon tower on South Court Street on property near the proposed U.S. Route 460 Bypass (that would replace the temporary tower discussed earlier). That request may also be heard in July.

Finally the Planning Commission is reviewing the Future Land-Use Map portion for the 2013 Comprehensive Plan. This important item will guide the development of Windsor for years to come showing where homes and businesses should be placed.
